

WILTSHIRE WASTE & RECYCLING CONTRACT HILLS RECYCLING REPORT – APR to JUN 2009 WASTE & RECYCLING STATISTICS

1.1 QUARTER 1 2009/10

1.1.1 Summary

Quarter 1 produced 67,147 tonnes of contract waste and landfill diversion of 34,110 tonnes - a landfill diversion rate of 50.8%. This recovery figure includes 557 tonnes of waste sent to Lakeside for energy recovery. The delivery of waste to Lakeside started at the end of quarter 1, and is not expected to be settled until mid to late July.

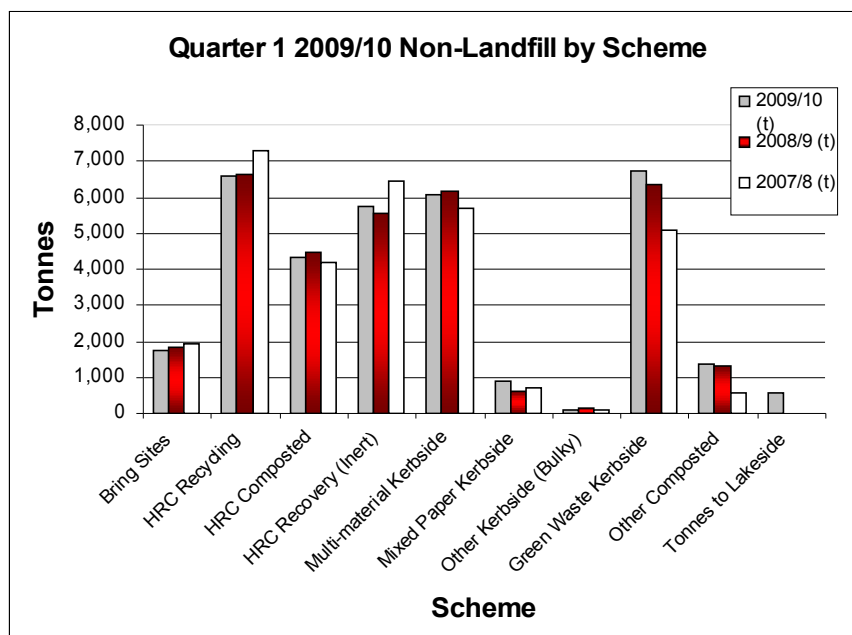
1.1.2 HRCs

HRC tonnage represented 49.6% of the recycled tonnage in the quarter. HRC recycling rates in the quarter ranged from 75.2% to 84.4%, average 80.6%, and contributed 16,658 tonnes of landfill diversion. This figure is within 4 tonnes of the figure in quarter 1 last year.

1.1.3 Multi-Material Kerbside

In the quarter 6,070 tonnes of material was collected. The service now covers over 95% of all households. Performance is 1.9% down on last year, with papers being hardest hit by the recession.

1.1.4 Quarter 1 2008/9 Waste & Recycling Summary/Comparison



Overall waste arisings in quarter 1 are 1.7% lower than last year and 3.9% lower than in 2007/8.

1.4 RECYCLING SINCE CONTRACT COMMENCEMENT

Since contract commencement in July 1996, 769,220 tonnes of municipal waste have been non-landfilled.

We have now commenced the separation of domestic batteries under the new EU directive from all sites. Due to the new regulations from the EA requesting the non-landfill of plasterboard with effect of the 1st April four sites across the county have been designated disposal points for the public, Amesbury, Devizes, Honeyball and Melksham.

The new Warminster site is expected to open in September 2009. Construction work is underway and both Planning and the Environmental Permit have been issued. No progress re Marlborough.
